

How to get in: conditions for membership

- Copenhagen criteria (1993)
- •→ Political
 - Stable democratic institutions
 - Human rights, protection of minorities
 - Rule of law
- •→ Economic
 - Functioning market economy
 - Capacity to cope with competitive forces in EU
- → Ability to take on obligations of membership

Administrative capacity


It is mostly entirely for each Member State to decide which structure it will use, provided that the effect of implementing the requirements of the *acquis* is achieved. Public health systems in the candidate countries should become sustainable, based on adequate organisational structures and financial resources, aiming at contributing to the health and well-being of the population.

This is largely a question of **strengthening existing institutions**, in order to enable them to carry out new tasks. A sufficient and well-trained public health workforce should also be ensured.

Accession negotiations: The Process

- **Opinion** (avis) of the Commission
- Member States' decision to open accession negotiations
- Opening of chapters in the negotiations:
 - → Screening process, chapter by chapter, followed by a Commission recommendation on the opening of chapters
 - Currently ongoing with Montenegro
 - → EU-27 unanimous decision (intergovernmental conference)
- Setting of closing benchmarks in view of closing the negotiations



Accession negotiations: The Process

- Chapter provisionally closed following unanimous decision by the Member States.
- Chapters **definitively closed** only when all negotiations with the candidate country are concluded.

IPA – **Instrument for Pre-accession Assistance**

- 5 components:
 - I. Transition Assistance and Institution Building (IB)
 - II. Regional and Cross-Border Cooperation
 - III. Regional Development
 - IV. Human Resources Development
 - V. Rural Development
- Eligibility to IPA
 - Candidate countries: access to all 5 components
 - Potential candidates:
 - support to SAA process
 - eligibility to components I and II
 - IB projects for other components eligible under I



Objectives of IPA II

- Support for political reforms
- Support for economic, social and territorial development and reforms, with a view to a sustainable, smart and inclusive growth
- Strengthening of the ability to fulfil the obligations stemming from membership (progressive alignment with and implementation of the acquis and EU structural, cohesion, agricultural and rural development funds and policies)
- Regional integration and territorial cooperation involving beneficiary countries, Member States (as well as third countries under the European Neighbourhood Instrument, as appropriate)



Guiding principles for designing IPA II

- Reinforced link between the financial assistance and the policy agenda
- Contribute to the objectives of the EU 2020 Agenda
- Good governance and capacity building remain core themes of financial assistance
- More attention to socio-economic development and lasting impact
- Stronger ownership of the reform agenda and related financial assistance
