# WELCOME TO DUBLIN 2023

## OUR FOOD, OUR HEALTH, OUR EARTH: A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE FOR HUMANITY

Today, we find ourselves at a crucial turning point in history. The global climate is rapidly deteriorating. The interconnection between food systems, health and earth demands urgent and sustainable action to protect our planet and all its inhabitants. From deforestation and greenhouse gas emissions to water pollution and biodiversity loss, our choices in food production, distribution, and consumption directly affect the Earth's health. Equally concerning is the impact on human health and well-being, with rising rates of diet-related diseases and malnutrition threatening the lives of millions.

We now have no way out in terms of climate emergency. We must make choices which will determine the future of our advanced technological civilisation. We know what to do, to deliver a future for our society, but it's less clear that we will do it. In a few weeks' time, COP28 will take place and will hopefully address the urgent need for climate action. In the run-up to COP28, food systems and agriculture have received increasing diplomatic attention. This in itself is a hopeful sign as previous COPs have seen significant political opposition to actions to change food systems and save biodiversity. The current agenda calls on countries to align national food systems with national adaptation plans which include targets for food system decarbonization and biodiversity strategies.

The EPH Conference in Dublin hopes to open part of this discussion, with a focus on sustainability, food and health. Building a future, any kind of future, for us and our children, demands a new attention to sustainability. We will look specifically at global health, the use of digital tools, equity in health and the necessary staffing and skills to provide good care. We will, in line with the overall conference theme, look in depth at the climate emergency, and very specifically at the human food supply.

The plenary programme is organised in collaboration with our partners and discuss the conference theme in greater detail.

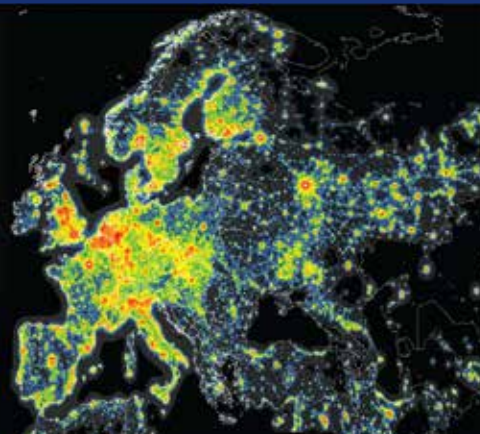

# PLENARY SPEAKERS



## **Anthony Staines – Chair of the 16th EPH Conference 2023 and Professor of Health Systems**

Anthony Staines is Professor of Health Systems at the Centre for Integrated Care and School of Nursing, Psychotherapy and Community Health, Dublin City University, Dublin, Ireland. He is an epidemiologist and a public health consultant whose research focusses on the uses of (digital) information in health care. He has a particular interest in child health and disability. Working closely with the Health Intelligence Unit in the Health Services Executive in Ireland, he has led a number of projects to deliver innovative health information approaches in Ireland and Europe. He teaches on programmes in public health and health systems within DCU, and on digital health in an innovative national programme led by the Health Services Executive. He was formerly the chair of the Irish Blood Transfusion service, and now leads St. Michael's House, one of the larger providers of services for people with Intellectual Disability in Ireland.



## **Simon Bacon – Professor at the Department of Exercise Science, Concordia University, Montreal, Canada**

Simon Bacon is Full Professor at the Department of Exercise Science, Concordia University, Montreal, Canada. His research deals with the impact of health behaviours (e.g., physical activity, diet, weight management, stress) on the development and progression of chronic diseases (e.g., obesity, cardiovascular disease, COVID-19). He utilises multiple methodologies including epidemiological, psychophysiological, evidence syntheses, and behavioural trials designs. Currently, Simon Bacon is the co-chair in Artificial Intelligence and Digital Health for Health Behaviour Change and the Canadian Institutes Health Research (CIHR) – Strategy for Patient-Oriented Research (SPOR) Chair in Innovative, Patient-Oriented, Behavioural Clinical Trials. He is also a fellow of the Obesity Society, the Canadian Cardiovascular Society, and the Academy of Behavioural Medicine Research. In addition to Concordia University, Simon is co-director of the Montreal Behavioural Medicine Centre, a researcher at the Centre intégré universitaire de santé et de services sociaux du Nord-de-l'Île-de-Montréal (CIUSSS-NIM), and co-leads the International Behavioural Trials Network and the CIHR funded Canadian Behavioural Interventions and Trials Network.



## **Francesco Branca – Director of the Department of Nutrition for Health and Development, World Health Organization**

Dr Francesco Branca is the Director of the Department of Nutrition for Health and Development in the World Health Organization, Geneva. During his tenure, WHO has established a new nutrition guideline development process and has developed a Comprehensive Implementation Plan on Maternal, Infant and Young Child Nutrition with six global targets. He has been leading the preparation of the 2nd International Conference on Nutrition. He has been a senior scientist at the Italian Food and Nutrition Research Institute (INRAN) where he was leading studies on the effects of food and nutrients on human health at the different stages of the life cycle and on the impact of public health nutrition programmes. He has been President of the Federation of the European Nutrition Societies from 2003 to 2007. Dr Branca graduated in Medicine and Surgery and specialized in Diabetology and Metabolic Diseases at the Università Cattolica del Sacro Cuore, Roma, Italy and obtained a PhD in Nutrition at Aberdeen University, United Kingdom.



## **Monica Georgiana Brînzac – Coordinator EUPHANxt**

Monica Georgiana Brînzac PhD(c) holds two master's degrees in Healthcare Management and in Science, Technology and Innovation in Governance, and a bachelor's degree in Public Health. She works as a Research Assistant at Babeş-Bolyai University, Cluj-Napoca, Romania, delving into areas like medical deserts, health workforce, mental health, maternal, youth health and broader public health matters. Monica is an integral part of EUPHA, where she fulfils the role of EUPHANxt coordinator. She contributes to shaping and advancing European public health initiatives and discussions. Her multifaceted background and dedication to healthcare research and policy make her a valuable asset within both academic and public health spheres.

# PLENARY SPEAKERS



**Holly Cairns – TD for Cork South–West and Leader of the Social Democrats and party spokesperson on Agriculture, Food and the Marine; Rural Development; Social Justice; and Disability, Ireland**

Holly Cairns is the Leader of the Social Democrats and party spokesperson on Agriculture, Food and the Marine; Rural Development; Social Justice; and Disability. She is a member of the Oireachtas Committee on Children, Disability, Equality and Integration. She was elected to Dáil Eireann in February 2020 in Cork South–West. In 2019, Holly Cairns won the final seat in the Bantry Local Election by a single vote. During her time on the Council, she made it her priority to highlight local environmental issues. Holly has a first class honours in MSc in Organic Horticulture from UCC. As part of her studies, she researched the methods and importance of plant adaptation in the face of unpredictable climates. Her background as a farmer and environmentalist inspired her to enter politics.



**Luke Clancy – Director–General TobaccoFree Research Institute Ireland**

Professor Luke Clancy is a founder and current director general of the TobaccoFree Research Institute Ireland (TFRI). He has held posts as Clinical Director CResT Directorate, St James’s Hospital, Dublin, Medical Director of Peamount Chest Hospital, Dublin, and Associate Professor Respiratory Medicine at Trinity College Dublin. The diagnosis and treatment of lung cancer and the health effects of air pollution (outdoor and smoking) feature in his research work and he has made major research contributions in the areas of tuberculosis, asthma, lung cancer and smoking related diseases. He was a key player in the Dublin Coal Ban in the 1980s. Starting with reporting the increased mortality associated with the Dublin smog, which led to the ban on burning of bituminous coal and later as Chairman of ASH Ireland he led the Health Alliance which played a significant role in achieving the successful Smokefree legislation in Ireland in 2004. He has directed and co-ordinated respiratory research projects and led TFRI in policy-driven research (including the evaluation of ‘Smokefree Ireland’) nationally and internationally with some 300 peer-reviewed publications and numerous published reports, books and chapters in books on air pollution, tobacco control and tuberculosis.



**Suzanne Costello – CEO, Institute of Public Health, Ireland**

Suzanne is the Chief Executive of the Institute of Public Health. She has overall responsibility for the strategic direction of the Institute. With a background in senior management across a range of health and social issues, Suzanne joined the Institute as Chief Executive at the end of 2018. Prior to joining the Institute, Suzanne served at the CEO of Alcohol Action Ireland and also acted as the Interim Policy Programme Lead for the HSE’s Alcohol Programme. Suzanne was Samaritans Executive Director for Ireland for six years. Suzanne has a primary degree in Social Science from University College Dublin, an MBS, and a Professional Diploma in Strategy, Innovation and Change from the Michael Smurfit Graduate School of Business and was a member of the inaugural Healthy Ireland Council.



**Caroline Costongs – Director EuroHealthNet**

Caroline Costongs is Director of EuroHealthNet, the European Partnership for improving health, social equity and wellbeing, based in Brussels. Caroline leads a multi-disciplinary team working on European Union and (sub)national policy, research and capacity building addressing health inequalities and the social determinants of health. She takes forward EuroHealthNet’s MoU with WHO Europe (2021-2026), is active in various EU and WHO fora and advisory boards, is a member of the Economy of Wellbeing Expert Group for Finland and of the ICC – International Council for the European Public Health Conference. Caroline has a strong international background in public health and health promotion and a MSc in Public Health from the University of Maastricht in the Netherlands.





**John Cuddihy – National Director of Public Health, Department of Public Health, Health Service Executive, Ireland**

Dr. John Cuddihy is HSE National Director of Public Health. John has been involved in Public Health reform in Ireland from the Crowe Horwath review and report implementation to more recently leading the implementation of the Public Health reform programme. He has previously held positions as Director of Public Health, Director of HPSC and National Clinical Director of Health Protection.



**Jerome de Barros – Policy Officer, Digital Health unit, Health and Food Safety Directorate General, European Commission**

Jerome de Barros is policymaker at the European Commission (DG SANTE) with more than ten years of experience in Digital Health programmes and policies. He is developing the European Health Data Space (EHDS) legislation and IT infrastructures with a focus on data quality aspects, and secondary uses of data, including research and innovation. Prior to joining the Commission, he was Data Driven Innovation Lead for Health and Care at the University of Edinburgh, United Kingdom, working, among other projects, on the set up of the DataLoch, an infrastructure bringing together and leveraging health and social care data for the South-East Scotland region.



**Isabel de la Mata – Principal Adviser for Health and Crisis Management, European Commission**

Isabel de la Mata is currently the Principal Adviser for Health and Crisis Management in the European Commission. Previously, she worked as Counsellor for Health and Consumers at the Permanent Representation of Spain to the EU, as Deputy Director General for Health Planning at the Spanish Ministry of Health, as Adviser to the Vice-minister of Health and several other posts at the Ministry of Health of Spain and the Regional Departments in the Basque Country and in Madrid. In addition, she has been a member of the EURO-WHO Standing Committee of the Regional Committee, and has worked with the Pan American Health Organisation, the Inter-American Development Bank and the Spanish Agency for International Cooperation. Isabel de la Mata graduated in Medicine and Surgery by the University of Basque Country in 1983 and holds post-graduate degrees from the University of Leuven and Paris VI in Public Health, Hospital Administration and Statistics. She is a specialist in Preventive Medicine and Public Health.



**Alisha Davies – Head of Research and Development, Health and Care Research Wales, United Kingdom**

Prof. Alisha Davies is an National Health Services (NHS) Consultant in Public Health, Head of Research and Evaluation at Public Health Wales where she leads a multi-disciplinary division working alongside academic partners to address knowledge gaps in public health policy and practice. Also, she is the Health Lead for AI For Science and Government at The Alan Turing Institute, London, United Kingdom. She is a strategic leader in public health research and evaluation, informing health policy and practice at a local and national level. She has published on public health in a digital era with an emphasis on equity including a recent review for WHO Europe. She holds postgraduate degrees in epidemiology, demography and public health from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, and an Honorary Professorship at Swansea University, United Kingdom.

# PLENARY SPEAKERS



## **Josep Figueras – Director European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies**

Josep Figueras (MD, MPH, PhD, FFPH) is the Director and cofounder of the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies. In addition to WHO, he has served major multilateral agencies such as the European Commission and the World Bank and has worked as policy advisor in more than forty countries within the European region and beyond. He was Co-chair of the Scientific Advisory Board of the Monti Commission, and member of several governing, advisory and editorial boards including the governance board of the European Health Forum Gastein. He is an honorary fellow of the UK Faculty of Public Health; received the Andrija Stampar Medal for excellence in Public Health and a Doctorate Honoris Causa from Semmelweis University, Hungary; and he has three times been awarded the EHMA prize for best annual publication. He is currently a visiting professor at the London School of Economics and Maastricht University, Netherlands. He was director of the MSc programme in Health Services Management and lecturer at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. Dr Figueras obtained his PhD from the University of London in 1993 on health policy and planning. He started his career as a specialist in Family and Community medicine in Spain.



## **Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus – Director-General of the World Health Organization**

Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus has been WHO Director-General since May 2017. Born in the Eritrean city of Asmara, Dr Tedros holds a Doctorate of Philosophy (PhD) in Community Health from the University of Nottingham and a Master of Science (MSc) in Immunology of Infectious Diseases from the University of London. Dr Tedros served as Ethiopia's Minister of Foreign Affairs and as Minister of Health between 2005 and 2016. After taking office as WHO Director-General, Dr Tedros initiated a wide ranging reform of WHO. Under his leadership, WHO achieved gender parity in its senior leadership for the first time. Training and equipping health workers worldwide has been a priority area of his work. Work is ongoing to launch the first WHO Academy, offering new and more effective methods of training in many areas of health to working people. WHO has launched a new Values Charter, which identifies the five key values that define who we are: public service; technical excellence; integrity; collaboration; and compassion. Recognizing health for all requires partnership at all levels, and between all sectors of society, Dr Tedros has worked hard to engage stakeholders from a broad range of sectors, from civil society and government, to the private sector and beyond. Dr Tedros is globally recognized as a health scholar, advocate and diplomat. He has received awards from across the globe. These include a Honorary Fellowship from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (2012) and more recently from the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland (2020).



## **Anant Jani – University of Heidelberg, Germany and Fellow Oxford Martin School, Oxford University, UK**

Anant Jani is a Research Fellow at the Heidelberg Institute for Global Health in Germany and the University of Oxford, United Kingdom. He focuses on understanding how we can improve population health by addressing social determinants of health. He is currently working on two large Horizon Europe projects exploring how we can redesign our food systems so that all Europeans can eat healthier and more sustainable diets (feast2030.eu) and how we can use novel financing mechanisms to fund interventions that promote health and prevent disease (Invest4Health). Prior to his research positions, Anant Jani worked in Europe and the Middle East to help healthcare systems within these countries to redesign their healthcare systems to focus more on value-based healthcare. Anant Jani has a PhD in immunology from Yale University.



### **Tim Lang – Emeritus Professor of Food Policy, City University of London, United Kingdom**

Tim Lang was Professor of Food Policy at City from 2002 to 2021 and had founded the Centre in 1994 at Thames Valley University. After a PhD in social psychology at Leeds University, he became a hill farmer in the 1970s in Lancashire which shifted his attention to food policy, where it has been ever since. For years, he's engaged in academic and public research and debate about its direction, locally to globally. His abiding interest is how policy addresses the mixed challenge of being food for the environment, health, social justice, and citizens. What is a good food system? How is ours measured and measuring up? He has been a consultant to the WHO, FAO and UNEP and advisor to House of Commons Select Committee inquiries on food standards, globalisation and obesity. He was a Commissioner on the UK Government's Sustainable Development Commission (2006-11) and policy lead Commissioner on the EAT-Lancet Commission on Healthy Diets from Sustainable Food Systems (2016-19) which published the highly acclaimed 'Food in the Anthropocene' report (The Lancet, 2019). Tim Lang has written and co-written any articles, reports, chapters and books. His most recent books include: Feeding Britain (2020), Food Wars (2015), Unmanageable Consumer (2015), Ecological Public Health (2012). He grows vegetables and fruit in his London garden, and is President of Garden Organic, a civil society organisation promoting low impact food production.



### **Martin McKee – Professor of European Public Health, London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, UK**

Prof Martin McKee is Professor of European Public Health at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. He qualified in medicine in Belfast, Northern Ireland, with subsequent training in internal medicine and public health. He was founding director of the European Centre on Health of Societies in Transition, a WHO Collaborating Centre, and which he led for over a decade. He is also research director of the European Observatory on Health Systems and Policies. He was chair of the Scientific Advisory Board of the Pan European Commission on Health and Sustainable Development (Monti Commission) and elected President of the British Medical Association for 2022/23. Martin McKee is a former Chair of the UK Society for Social Medicine and Past President of the European Public Health Association. He has published over 1,450 scientific papers and 50 books and have an h-Index (Google Scholar) of 173. He was an editor of the European Journal of Public Health for 15 years and is a member of numerous editorial boards, as well as being an editorial consultant to The Lancet. His contributions to European health policy have been recognized by the award of honorary doctorates from Hungary, The Netherlands, Sweden, Greece, and visiting professorships at the Universities of Zagreb and Belgrade, the London School of Economics, and Taipei Medical University. In 2003, he was awarded the Andrija Stampar medal for contributions to European public health and in 2005 was made a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE).



### **Ricardo Mexia – Chair of the 17th European Public Health Conference**

Ricardo Mexia (MD, MPH, EPIET) is a public health physician and epidemiologist. He works primarily in communicable diseases, epidemiological surveillance, public health emergencies and mass gatherings, having been involved in the investigation and control of several outbreaks, and providing training in field epidemiology. He is also a science communicator and collaborates regularly on health issues, in various media (TV, radio, online, written press). ## **Natasha Azzopardi Muscat – Director of the Division of Country Health Policies and Systems, WHO Regional Office for Europe**

Natasha Azzopardi Muscat is the Director of the Division of Country Health Policies and Systems, WHO Regional Office for Europe. Following her qualification as a medical doctor from the University of Malta in 1995, she worked in various areas in the health sector in Malta, including maternal and child health, mental health, and primary care. Her transdisciplinary research bridging health policy, European studies and small states studies led to her PhD entitled "The Europeanisation of health systems: a small state perspective". Since 1999, she has been a resident academic at the University of Malta, teaching in the department of health services management and public health. In 2003, she obtained her membership in the Faculty of Public Health of the United Kingdom. Between 2001 and 2013, she occupied various senior positions in the Ministry of Health in Malta, including that of Chief Medical Officer. Before joining WHO, she served as President of the European Public Health Association (EUPHA) from 2016 to 2020, where she was actively involved in health advocacy at the European level.



## **Iveta Nagyova – President European Public Health Association (EUPHA)**

Iveta Nagyova is the President of the European Public Health Association (EUPHA) and the Head of the Department of Social and Behavioural Medicine, Faculty of Medicine at Pavol Jozef Safarik University (UPJS) in Kosice, Slovakia. She serves as a member of several WHO advisory committees, including the WHO Technical Advisory Group on Behavioural Insights and Sciences for Health, the WHO/Europe's Regional Director's Advisory Council on Innovation for Noncommunicable Diseases, the Behavioural and Cultural Insights working groups, and the European Advisory Committee on Health Research. She graduated in Clinical psychology at UPJS, Slovakia, and obtained her PhD in Medical sciences from the University of Groningen, the Netherlands. Her research interests are in biobehavioural and psychosocial innovations in chronic disease prevention and management, non-pharmacological interventions, health behaviour change, and behavioural insights in public health. At the national level, she serves as an advisor to the WHO Country Office and the Slovak Ministry of Health.



## **David Novillo Ortiz – Regional Adviser – Data and Digital Health, WHO Regional Office for Europe**

David Novillo Ortiz works as unit head at the WHO Regional Office for Europe, coordinating the digital health flagship initiative and the data, metrics and analytics portfolio. Prior to joining WHO/Europe, he served as coordinator of the eHealth programme at the Pan American Health Organization from 2010–2018. Furthermore, David served from 2006 to 2010 as a Technical Officer for the Ministry of Health of Spain, where he was appointed Executive Advisor to the Minister. David obtained his Masters and PhD in Information Sciences from the University Carlos III of Madrid, Spain. He also received a Masters in Public Health from the University of Bordeaux, France, and the Public University of Navarre, Spain. He currently sits on the editorial board of the International Journal of Medical Informatics. In addition, he serves pro bono as an Honorary Senior Research Fellow at University College London, United Kingdom, and as an Adjunct Professor on biomedical informatics at the University of Utah, United States.



**Lucy Nugent – President European Association of Hospital Managers (EHAM) and Chief Executive of Tallaght University Hospital, Dublin, Ireland**

Lucy Nugent joined Tallaght University Hospital (TUH), Dublin, as Chief Operations Officer in 2014, moved to the role of Deputy CEO in 2016 and was appointed CEO in January 2019. Prior to joining TUH she worked in Ireland's Health Service Executive in their Acute Hospitals Division as Head of Quality Assurance & Risk Management, Clinical & Patient Services Manager in the Children's University Hospital Temple Street. Prior to that she worked in a number of nursing roles as a registered general and children's nurse. In addition to her nursing qualifications Ms Nugent has an MSc in Healthcare Management (TCD), BSc Nursing Studies (DCU), a Diploma in Infection Control (RCSI), a Diploma in Leadership & Quality in Healthcare (RCPI) and is a recent graduate of the IESE Business School Advanced Management Programme. She is a Past President of the Health Management Institute of Ireland and has represented it on several committees of the European Association of Hospital Managers and the International Hospital Federation. She is President of the European Association of Hospital Managers (EHAM) and is the first female to hold this position in its 52 year history.



**Mark Petticrew – Professor of Public Health, London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine, UK**

Mark Petticrew is Professor of Public Health at the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine (LSHTM), United Kingdom. He is Director of the National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) Public Health Policy Research Unit. His main research interests are in evidence-based policymaking, and the evaluation of the effects on health of social and other policies. His work also has a strong focus on the commercial determinants of health – in particular, the influence of unhealthy commodity industries on health (e.g. through the promotion of tobacco, alcohol, and unhealthy foods). Recent research includes analyses of misinformation disseminated by alcohol industry corporate social responsibility (CSR) bodies such as Drinkaware UK and Drinkwise (Australia). He is a collaborator in the SPECTRUM Consortium which investigates the commercial determinants of health and health inequalities. He was a founding member of the Cochrane/Campbell Health Equity Methods Group, which develops methods of incorporating an equity perspective into systematic reviews.



**Mary Robinson – Founder Mary Robinson Foundation – Climate Justice, former President of Ireland, former UN High Commissioner for Human Rights**

For more than 50 years, Mary Robinson has been campaigning for social change and has been a passionate advocate for human rights, gender equality, women's participation in peacebuilding, human dignity and climate justice. Mary Robinson is a strong advocate for climate justice and intergenerational dialogue. She led the Mary Robinson Foundation – Climate Justice between 2010-2019, a centre for education and advocacy on sustainable and people-centred development in the world's poorest communities. After successfully achieving its strategic objectives, the Foundation came to a planned close in April 2019. Other highlights of her career: President of Ireland, 1990-1997; United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, 1997-2002; Chancellor of the University of Dublin, 1998-2019; UN Special Envoy on Climate Change, 2014-2015; UN Special Envoy on El Niño and Climate, 2016; Chair of The Elders, 2018 – ; Adjunct Professor for Climate Justice, Trinity College Dublin, 2019 – .

Through her research and academic roles at the Universities of Belgrade and Amsterdam, and her leadership roles at EUFIC and ENLP, she has developed a remarkable expertise in scientific research, strategic partnerships, and driving change. Milka is skilled at developing and implementing organisational strategies, equipped with robust leadership competences, and armed with ample enthusiasm, all employed into ensuring a better health for all. It is an unceasing quest for a stronger impact and purpose that has taken Milka through a quarter of a century of her career.



## **Gunhild A. Stordalen – Founder and Executive Chair EAT Foundation**

Gunhild A. Stordalen is the founder and executive chair of EAT and a transformative force in linking climate, health, and sustainability to revolutionize the global food system. She has brought together world leaders, scientists, business leaders and NGOs to address one of the most critical questions of our time: How can we create sustainable, resilient, and just food systems that deliver healthy diets for everyone, everywhere? She started EAT in 2013 as a global initiative together with her co-founder Johan Rockstrom. In 2016, they joined forces with Wellcome Trust, and established EAT as a foundation with a science-based multi-stakeholder approach to solving the world's food issues, making a lasting impact on food security and environmental sustainability. Gunhild's commitment to a healthy, sustainable and just future has earned her accolades such as being named WWF Sweden's Environmental Hero of the Year, Young Global Leader of the World Economic Forum and the UN Foundation's Global Leadership Award. Gunhild Stordalen is a medical doctor from the University of Oslo and holds a PhD in pathology/orthopedic surgery. She is involved in numerous boards and councils, including the United Nation's Scaling Up Nutrition Movement Lead Group, the World Economic Forum (WEF) Stewardship Board on Food Systems, and the Stockholm Resilience Center.



## **George Valiotis – Executive Director European Health Management Association (EHMA)**

George Valiotis is the Executive Director of EHMA. He represents the voice of health management to many European and international bodies including the European Parliament, the European Commission, the World Health Organisation, industry bodies, and community groups. George chairs EHMA's webinar series, guides the coordination of the annual conference and has an active role in all EHMA's projects by providing high-level advice on health management matters. Prior to joining EHMA, George was the Chief Executive Officer of a Scottish policy agency focusing on blood-borne viruses and sexual infections. He has managed multiple strategic policy and education collaborations with diverse stakeholder, worked as an education specialist for the International AIDS Society, served on the Board of Diabetes Australia and as an Advisor on its Medical Education and Science Council and as Principal Strategic Advisory to the Commissioner for Children and Young People, Scotland.

# FERENC BOJAN YOUNG INVESTIGATORS AWARD



Since 1997, EUPHA has installed a Ferenc Bojan lecture/award in memory of the EUPHA president who tragically died from a car accident in Hungary in February 1997.

*Ferenc Bojan qualified in medicine from Debrecen, in eastern part of Hungary in 1970 and spent his early professional career in the academic department of hygiene in Debrecen. In 1989 he moved to the Department of Social Medicine, as its head and rapidly recognized the need to address the problems of chronic underfunding and the failure to adopt modern approaches to public health. He strove to ensure that Hungary was integrated into the wider European public health community, taking the Hungarian Society for Public Health into EUPHA and subsequently being elected as EUPHA president. Ferenc Bojan used his period in office to support the expansion of EUPHA to neighbouring countries. Throughout the 1990s, he was an inspiration to and gave much support to those in other parts of this region.*

In order to continue the legacy of Ferenc Bojan, the EUPHA Executive Council decided in 1997 to have one session called the 'Ferenc Bojan Memorial Lecture'. After few year it has been transformed in a conference session entitled 'Ferenc Bojan Young Investigators Award'.

Here the five highest scoring abstracts from young professionals (under 35 years) are invited to present their abstract to a small committee. The committee combines abstract with presentation and the winner of the Ferenc Bojan award is announced in the closing session.

To give delegates time to move from one session to the next, the programme allows for 10-minutes walking time in between sessions.

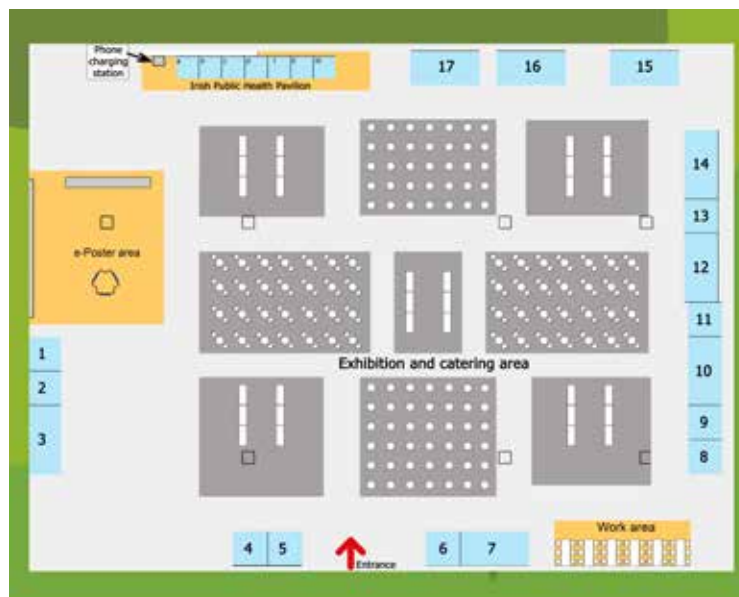
